Hello all, and welcome to Issue 24 October 2016, of 'Out and About in VK5'. This newsletter focuses on South Australian (VK5) activities relating to Summits on the Air (SOTA), Parks (including WWFF and the VK5 National & Conservation Parks Award), portable operation, QRP, pedestrian mobile, mobile, etc.

'Out and About in VK5' has now been running for 2 years and is read by amateurs across Australia and in Europe and North America.

After my plea for articles in August, I received a positive response, but sadly things have fallen backwards, with very few VK5 contributions this month. The only VK5 contributors this month were John VK5BJE with some info on a recent park activation, and Rod VK5VRB with his perspective on hunting parks. Thanks for taking the time to submit an article Rod. Also, many thanks to Rob VK4FFAB for his

Wow, did the month of September pass extremely quickly, and what a memorable month it was as well. The weather in South Australia was less than ideal for SOTA and Parks activating. Very severe weather patterns resulted in widespread and severe flooding across the State, whilst a mini tornado and associated lightning, took out numerous electricity towers in the north of VK5, which resulted in a power blackout for the entire State. Here at my qth, we were without power for 21 hours. So it was out with the portable gear for me in the shack. As a result of the

weather, many National Parks and Conservation Parks were closed across VK5.

I headed over to the Eyre Peninsula where I activated 8 Conservation Parks. The bothy bag certainly got a workout over there with quite wet conditions.

Other VK5 park activators included Bob VK5FO who activated a couple of 'unique' parks, John VK5BJE, and Les VK5KLV who also put on air a 'unique' park.

I have included in this issue an article on snake bite, as despite the weather last month, we are starting to head into the warmer weather.

Planning continues for the SOTA & Parks symposium, similar to what was held a few years ago. It will include presentations from a number of experts in the field, a linked dipole construction session, and some portable sessions out in the field. I'll keep you all

updated as this progresses. If the last symposium is any indication, this event should prove to be extremely popular. It will be a great way of honing your skills, or perhaps giving you enough confidence to try your very first SOTA or Park activation.

Other upcoming events include the VKFF Team Championship (on 16th October); the 6th annual Keith Roget Memorial National Parks Award Activation Weekend (11th-14th November); and then the VKFF Activation Weekend (26th and 27th November). So there arte plenty of opportunities coming up to get out into the field.

Snake bite

If you are unfortunate enough to be the victim of snake bite, there are some very important facts which you should be aware of.

WARNING.

DO NOT wash venom off the skin

DO NOT cut the bitten area

DO NOT try to suck venom out of the wound

DO NOT use a torniquet

DO NOT try to catch the snake.

Signs are not always visible but may be a puncture mark of marks, bleeding or scratches.

Symptoms developing within an hour may include headache, impaired vision, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, breathing difficulties, drowsiness, faintness, problems speaking of swallowing.

What to do

- 1. Follow DRSABCD.
- 2. Reassure the patient and ask them not to move.

3. Apply a broad crepe bandage over the bite site as soon as possible.



4. Apply a pressure bandage (heavy crepe or elasticised roller bandage) starting just above the fingers or toes of the bitten limb, and move upwards on the limb as far as can be reached (include the snake bite). Apply firmly without stopping blood supply to the limb.



5. Immobilise the bandaged limb with splints.



- 6. Ensure the patient does not move.
- 7. Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. Stay with the patient.
- 8. Regularly check circulation in fingers or toes.
- 9. Manage for shock. 10. Ensure an ambulance has been called.

If possible could you alert all the happy park activators that we have made a decision that all national or conservation parks will count for the shire that they are actually bordered by. Yes some are going to have more than 1 shire but 99% will only be within the boundary of a single shire. For those parks that are bordered by 2 shires then everyone will be eligible to claim both.

Space Weather By Paul VK5PAS




If you have an interest in propagation conditions, as most SOTA & Park activators are, then the Space Weather Prediction Center website, will undoubtedly be of interest to you.

Parks Hunter – A beginners guide

Although I have activated a few VK5 parks I am normally the comfortable operator safe in my shack and hunting those who brave the elements, tracks, and endless roads. I am a gold level hunter. I'm not an all day hunter, perhaps one of two now and then. I have been hunting since the early days of the parks concept and have some of my experiences to share.

I don't want to argue about anything that follows, for this is just my opinion. If you don't agree, then fine, just move along.

Where are the Activators?

Firstly, where will you find an activator. In our current propagation conditions sometimes they are on 20m but most activity is on 40m.

You can find most current (transmitting now) activators listed on:

Although I do get my biggest joy just monitoring a frequency and catching someone's initial call. I see it as fun to have the number 1 slot in an activators log for that day.

I have found the following frequencies the best to monitor:

7.090 From memory where it all began 7.130 Recognised by many from the 7.130 DX net (Google that one, it's pretty good) 7.144 It seems of recent times Paul has made this frequency a regular calling point in his activations.

Without weighing into the debate I find it best to leave 7.125 to our AM brothers and sisters. If I hear an activator calling I won't respond but move on to another.

Hunting the Wolf Pack

This is a fairly standard DX technique. When the call goes out, if you are monitoring the frequency you might get in first and that is great (another first spot in a log). After that, particularly with a popular activator like Paul, a large pack of hunters will form. I find the experienced activator will quickly scribble down all who call back. If you have modest equipment (like me) it's best to pause for 1 or 2 seconds and then give your call sign. Trying to get in before VK5SUPERDUPER with his 5 element yagi and linear is just a waste of time. Failing this, enjoy the banter and when the activator calls last calls (as they should) call then. This is a good tip for F class holders.

If you miss out, just smile, there is always another activator.

A Couple of Dos and Don'ts

- Don't tune up on the frequency (you'd be surprised). I normally start my session tuning to 7.100 (if it's free) just to make sure all is okay.
- Don't talk over people, especially F calls.
 Give everyone a go.
- Keep conversations short. It's not a comp so you can be a little more expansive but remember there are others waiting. Normally by the time I speak to someone I've got the park name off the web (if not, then and only then, ask for it – they can be a challenge to spell).
- Slow down at the end of your first over, giving your call sign slowly and clearly (not phonetically unless asked) – the activator needs to record, or confirm, it accurately. Give the activator a signal report, your location, and your name.
- Don't shout to get a call, it only distorts your voice.
- The activator may say she is QSY to 20m. If you are an F class then by all means follow to listen in, but don't transmit, however tempting.

If this helps just one person then it was worth the time to write it.

Are you inside the park boundary?

A recent post on the WWFF Australia Yahoo group re the VK Shires Award certainly sparked some conversation. You would have read that a decision was made by the VK Shires Award manager/s that all national or conservation parks will count for the shire that they are actually bordered by.

This resulted in conversation regarding park activators responsibilities for ensuring that they are within the park boundaries.

Many parks here in South Australia, are not well signposted, if at all. They are often surrounded by other pieces of scrub, which are not within the park boundary. Both the WWFF & VK5 Parks rules clearly state that you must be within the park boundaries for the activation to be valid.

Two sites that are particularly useful in determing park boundaries are:

Both are capable of clearly showing you were park boundaries are.

Naming of WWFF logs

Please remember to name your WWFF logs in the following way.....

callsign@referenceYYYYMMDD

e.g. VK1ABC@VKFF011520150501

And some further info from Logsearch Administrator, Andrew MoYMA......

Q: What log formats are supported?

A: ADIF

Q: How do I specify the operator callsign?

A: The following fields should be used:

- STATION_CALLSIGN the callsign used on the air by the activating station
- OPERATOR the home-call of the individual operator who made the QSO

Q: How do I specify the WWFF reference?

A: The following fields should be used:

- MY_SIG should specify "WWFF"
- MY_SIG_INFO should specify the WWFF reference

For legacy, MY_SIG may be used to specify the reference.

Q: How do I specify the Hunter WWFF reference (for the Park 2 Park Award)?

A: The following fields should be used:

- SIG should specify "WWFF"
- SIG_INFO should specify the Hunter
 WWFF reference

Q: What other ADIF fields are required?

A: The following ADIF fields are required:

- CALL the full callsign of the hunter
- QSO_DATE
- TIME ON
- BAND
- MODE

All other fields are ignored.


Hand-carried QRP antennas is an ebook readable on most devices. It's the author's second book, following on from the top-selling Minimum QRP, released last year.



Celebrating Belair National Park's 125th birthday

On Sunday 11th September, 2016, an open day was held at the Belair National Park (VKFF-0022 & 5NP-001), to celebrate the park's 125th birthday.



Belair National Park is South Australia's oldest National Park, having been established in 1891. It was the second park to be declared a National Park, falling only behind the Royal National Park in NSW which was established in 1879.

John VK5BJE had been approached by the Senior Ranger for the Mount Lofty Parklands, asking if he would be interested in setting up an amateur radio station as part of the Open Day. John kindly asked myself and my wife Marija VK5FMAZ along for the day.


A new park

Simply go to the main search page on Logsearch and click on 'Edit Profile' in the top right hand corner. Then add the relevant call sign/s in the Callsigns area located in the 'Information' section.

Don't forget to click on 'Update' once you have done this.

VK1 award: 1 shire VK2 award: Basic 25 shires, silver 50 shires, gold all shires VK3 award: Basic 25 shires, silver 50 shires, gold all shires VK4 award: basic 25 shires, silver 50 shires, gold all shires VK5 award: basic 25 shires, silver 50 shires, gold all shires VK6 award: basic 25 shires, silver 50 shires, gold all shires VK7 award: basic 10 shires, gold all shires, gold all shires, gold all shires, gold all shires, silver 10 shires, gold all shires **Please note that all VK9 and VK0 call areas do not count for this award.

***For those who actually go and activate a shire you must work a minimum of 50 stations to be eligible to claim the shire for yourself for all parts of the award except the Nomad Award as above. A copy of your log must be sent to the awards manager for verification.

**** Endorsements for SSB or CW or specific

bands or QRP etc are available.

***** All National Parks, State Forests, SOTA etc within the boundaries of a shire shall count for that very shire.





Clements Gap

My wife, Jenny and I decided to take a few days off and we originally planned to re-visit the Riverland for a birdwatching and amateur radio experience. We like the Riverland and have visited many times. However, after checking the **Department of Environment, Water and Natural Resources** (DEWNR) web pages to consider some of the newly listed parks on the WWFF list, I saw that they were closed because of flooding. I was particularly interested in two parks that have not been activated as yet. Oh well, someone else might be able to have the pleasure!

Our replacement location was Port Augusta and environs. We like this part of the state and Port Augusta has been the launching pad for many of our 4×4 adventures in the past. We left home on Monday 26th September just before lunch and **Clements Gap Conservation Park**, VKFF-0812 was in our sights. We arranged accommodation at Port Pirie before we departed home. Clements Gap is just south of Port Pirie. In preparing for my visit I read Paul's

blog (VK5PAS). He has previously activated this park and, as usual, it was very helpful. Les, VK5KLV, from Port Augusta, responded to my post on the Yahoo group advising of my intention to visit the area. He activated this park very recently and warned of the flies and mosquitos. He suggested lots of repellant and a fly net as well if I did not want to supplement my diet with flies! I plastered my clothes with repellent but the little 'nasties' still found me!

Gap Road dissects the park. The park is a bush land oasis in an agricultural area. I found a spot on the left hand side of the road in a clearing.



The clearing is accessible by 4×4 and is visible on the Mapcartamap (under the nts in Clements Post Office, the left hand side of the road travelling right to left on the map).



As we were to travel to Port Pirie for the evening and I only had about two hours to play I decided to erect my two band antenna for 40 and 20 metres.

I was on the air at 06:21 UTC and enjoyed 21 contact with VK 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 stations all on 40 metres. I tried 20 metres without success. Thanks to all who gave me a call and a special thanks to those who spotted me on parks and peaks. I did not have internet coverage at this point. My station comprised my Yaesu 857D set for 20 watts, powered from my 33 amp hour battery 'thumper', which was kept charged from the sun using my solar panels.



While I did advertise that I would call CQ on 7.144 and did for a few minutes without success I then had a listen on the bands. I finished on 7.115 and worked 24 stations.




