From CPC Chairman Les Rayburn, N1LF:

DX Test material consisting of jingles, Morse Code ID's, sweep tones, etc have been produced for **WNJC 1360** in Washington Township NJ and **KSEN 1150** in Shelby MT. These files were delivered to both stations, but no definitive dates have been set for testing yet.

Tests will be conducted in conjunction with transmitter maintenance periods. These days, maintenance is dependent on scheduling engineering services with engineers and contractors often serving multiple stations. Tests will often be short-notice and subject to cancellation.

It is best to have multiple ways to receive notification of tests, off-air maintenance periods, etc. These may include the Email lists for the IRCA, National Radio Club, Facebook Groups devoted to AM DXing, and the AM DX Logger. There is also a MW DX "Slack" Channel.

Whenever possible, advance notification will be given to the DXing community. But you can no longer rely on printed (ie regular – pb) publications to receive advance warning of tests.

Keep an ear on 1360 and 1150 in the coming weeks.

Bob Smoak of Bamberg SC sends along the following via the ABDX Groups dated 8/10/20:

I've had trouble getting WLAC at night in Bamberg SC. I found out why. A transmission line on the DA failed. The FCC granted them an STA for operation into the day stick with 25% power or less. If 25%, that would be 12,500 watts, which would reduce the non-directional signal to 1/2 that of the full power signal.

Paul Walker Jr of Laramie WY sends along the following via the ABDX Groups dated 8/11/20:

From the FCC database this morning after KFXN (690 AM, Minneapolis MN-ye ed) lost one tower and had feed lines cut, they're asking for Special Temporary Authority to operate non directional with lower power. "The center tower of the KFXN 3 tower array collapsed on August 10th. The collapse severed the feed lines to the center and west towers. KFXN is currently operating with only the east tower with a power of 120 watts. Authority is requested for this operating, pending restoration of licensed service."

Paul Walker Jr sends along the following via the ABDX Groups dated 8/11/20 (also passed on by Mike Sanburn of Bellflower CA):

KROS 1340 / 105.9 Clinton IA OFF AIR. The stations' 400-foot tower collapsed in a 100mph plus wind Monday night, talk the AM and it's translator off the air. Here's pics from the station, you shouldn't need to log into or even have Facebook to view them:

Paul Walker Jr sends along the following via the ABDX Groups dated 8/11/20:

WMT 600 Cedar Rapids lost a tower and is currently off the air. This makes the 3rd known station to lose a tower, along with KROS and KFXN (note: KROS and KFXN information above-ye ed).

(Paul sends along additional information dated 8/12/20):

STA Filed and Granted today for WMT. We request special temporary authority ('STA') to operate station WMT (AM) during night mode with temporary facilities.

High winds, probably associated with the widely reported August 10 2020 derecho event, toppled a tower in the night array. The daytime non-directional facilities were not harmed. We are requesting to operate an emergency antenna consistent with 73.1680 consisting of the non-directional daytime facilities, which is a vertical element of the directional antenna system, with power reduced to 25% or less of the nominal licensed nighttime power, or a higher power not exceeding licensed power while insuring that the radiated filed strength does not exceed that authorized in any given azimuth for the corresponding nighttime hours of directional operation. Emergency operation.

The interests of the public will be served by WMT continuing to provide service to the community during repairs.

Licenses cancelled: 8-10-2020: KKAA-1560 Aberdeen, South Dakota, 8-10-2020: KNDF-1560 Daingerfield, Texas

Paul Walker Jr adds information re KKAA-1560 above via ABDX Groups dated 8/12/20:

It had been silent awhile and when it was on, it was operating at much lower than licensed power and nondirectional. It was a multi tower station that was getting beyond repair and/or expensive to maintain and to do anything with it would've been costly or economically viable. I know some of this info 2nd hands direct from people who we're involved.

Dennis Gibson adds information re KKAA-1560 above via IRCA groups.io dated 8/12/20:

KKAA was granted a Silent STA that expires on September 19. I wonder if the license was surrendered. http://licensing.fcc.gov/cgi-bin/prod/cdbs/forms/prod/getimportletter_exh.cgi?import_letter_id=92669 http://licensing.fcc.gov/cgi-bin/ws.exe/prod/cdbs/pubacc/prod/sta_det.pl?Facility_id=15965. Today's FCC Daily Digest says KKAA's license was cancelled because the licensee requested cancellation by email.

(Paul Walker Jr adds to this subject dated 8/13/20): Read the FCC report and northpine.com on the KKKA deletion. The licensee requested license deletion on August 10. The station has had numerous STAs over the years due to costly and complicated directional antenna issues dating back almost 2 decades.

KRSN to Cease Operations - Lance Venta by Lance Venta August 12 2020

1490 107.1 KRSN Los Alamos David and Gillian Sutton's 1490 KRSN/107.1 K296GI Los Alamos NM will cease operations on August 30.

The Los Alamos Reporter states, "With the cancellation of high school sports, events, the closure of small businesses and the struggles of those remaining, KRSN can no longer raise the advertising revenues it takes to run your free to you community radio station." The Suttons purchased KRSN in 2006 from the bankruptcy trustee of Real Radio LLC for \$67,000. They state that they are in negotiations with other parties "in hopes it remains a community radio station".

The Full Service Classic Rock station wrote the following message regarding the shutdown on the station's website:

KRSN AM 1490 and FM 107.1 will be going dark after Sunday August 30. David and Gillian Sutton have proudly owned and operated the community radio station for the last 15 years, broadcasting local news, weather, sports and a variety of programming for your enjoyment. David and Gillian both grew up in Los Alamos listening to KRSN, and when the station was in bankruptcy and for sale, they felt it was important to keep the community station broadcasting. Gillian had worked at KRSN when she was in high school, and with David's skills as an engineer, they took a leap of faith and embarked on a career as radio broadcasters.

Worked at KHSN when sne was in high school, and with David's skills as an engineer, they took a leap or fath and embarked on a career as radio broadcastes.

KRSN broadcasted high school sports, and relatives of local athletes tuned in from all around the country.

With the Voice of the Hill Toppers Gene Mortenson and crews called football, soccer, basketball, volleyball and baseball, and Rick Pickard joined David announcing ice hockey, the recordings of the games created valuable memories for Topper families. That's approximately 150 Topper football games, 500

basketball games, 300 baseball and softball games, 150 hockey games and a few hundred more volleyball, and soccer games.

In 2010, Nancy Coombs joined David as a co-host of the Morning Show, which featured local news, off the wall stories in Dave's World, Earth Date and Science in the Sea, and interviews. Coombs says, I love interviewing people, letting them talk about things they are passionate about. It is a fantastic way to start the day. That is about 7,500 interviews, including Senators, congressman, governors, County Councilors, County Managers, County personnel, doctors, lawyers, artists, authors, heroes, teenagers and children. KRSN has won numerous broadcasting awards including Radio Station of the Year, National Crystal Radio Award finalist, Broadcaster of the Year and New Mexico Presswomen's awards. Our show hosts have won awards of excellence, and our sportscaster Mr. Gene Mortenson is in the New Mexico Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

KRSN mentored DJ's into their careers in broadcasting. Gillian reflects, It has been an honor to run the community radio station and we will miss it. David added we've had a lot fun and hope you enjoyed our shows. With the cancellation of high school sports, events, the closure of small businesses and the struggles of those remaining, KRSN can no longer raise the advertising revenues it takes to run your free to you community radio station. We appreciate all our loyal listeners over the years, as we say farewell. We are negotiating with other parties to purchase the station in hopes it remains a community radio station. We are still fulfilling all FCC and FAA requirements in maintaining all of KRSN's assets.

Paul Walker Jr sends along the following from Kit Sage of Arvada CO via ABDX Groups dated 8/12/20:

I can confirm KLVZ is on the air tonight, 8/12. I have my AM gear hooked up. I initially thought this was Que Suave KSWV, but it's KLVZ (KSWV is a pest for me on 810 here in Albuquerque-ye ed). Paul added a comment a few hours later on 8/12 re this subject: but 3 hours later, I'm not sure it is (on the air-ye ed). I'm hearing KGO (810 San Francisco CA-ye ed). 600 CKSP Vancouver BC signed on today using varying power levels as it tests its new transmitter and antenna combiner in tandem with co-sited 980 CKNW. I don't think it's used full power yet. CKSP will be 50 kW day, 20 kW night into a two-tower directional array. Using imaging slogan "Sher-E-Punjab radio" programming will be South Asian Indian languages — Punjabi and Hindu. "Sher-E-Punjab" up to now has been airing on cross-border 1550 KRPI Ferndale WA as an LMA for the past several years. It's likely a new LMA programmer will program KRPI now that Surrey BC based "Sher-E-Punjab" has its own facility.

KFOY 1060 Sold Back to Lotus, 1180 KCKQ Gets Deleted (both stations in Reno NV-Sparks NV market-ye ed)

It looks like the talk programming from 1180 will simply move over to 1060. Having one more station would put Lotus over the cap, the day signals at 5kw day ND for 1060 and 4KW Day ND for 1180 aren't much different... but 1060 is 500W 2 towers night, not very directional and 1180 is a 2 tower very directional missing a lot of the city (with a) 190 watt night signal.

(Dennis Gibson of Salinas CA adds to this subject dated 8/17/20): Those two stations are part of a quadplex with KPLY-630 and KHIT-1450.

KNAM 1490 Silt CO Format Change. It was sports, it's now classic hits as "The Monkey", feeding three translators, including the primary 95.7 Grand Junction.

Yet another new AM station on the air in Canada! Last issue it was CHAH-580 Edmonton and this issue CKSP-600 Vancouver that is testing. A purist might argue that neither station is new, since both frequencies were occupied in their current locations in the past. Both stations, however, are newly licensed by the CRTC with no reference to the previous stations on those frequencies, or their owners, with all new equipment and sharing towers with other stations since the previous sites were not available to them. CISL-650 is using the old 600 site; and recent annexations by Edmonton and the Town of Beaumont make the former CKUA-580 transmitter site ripe for future development, so CHAH moved to the nearby CBX-740 towers.

The CRTC has fallen behind on license renewals due to COVID-19, which necessitated short term renewals of a large number of AM and FM station licenses that would have expired August 31, some to February 28 2021 and others to August 31 2021.

The Facebook page Canadian Radio News by **Dan Sys** provides much of the information for this column.

600 BC Vancouver First heard testing the afternoon of 8/13, with continuous Punjabi music, either on night pattern or with severely reduced power. On 8/14, they were simulcasting CISF-FM's HD2 channel, Desi Mix Radio, which is also Puniabi music, but with IDs. fccinfo.com indicates the night pattern has a broad lobe to the ENE but almost no power in other directions.

No longer expected to be off the air during the evening hours as it was prior to CKSP's full-time testing. CKSP shares 980 BC New Westminster **CKNW** two of the four CKNW towers in the Cloverdale area of Surrey.

Applied to run non-directional at night, even though it requires night power to be reduced from 10,000 to 32 watts. Day 1260 NB Fredericton **CKHJ** power and pattern will remain 10KW non-directional. The technical brief states that 32 watts is the equivalent of the deepest Null, towards the southwest, in the current figure-8 directional pattern. Fredericton is only about 50 air miles from the US border.

100 Years Ago - on August 28 1920, the Canadian National Exhibition opened in Toronto. The National Railways exhibit included a radio station with regularly scheduled daily broadcasts of concerts on phonograph records from a transmitter in one building to a receiver in another building for visitors to hear. The broadcast was also heard three and a half miles away, where newspaper men and others were gathered.

75 Years Ago - on September 3 1945, CFOR-1450 Orillia ON officially launched with 250 watts, after moving from Parry Sound where it had existed since 1942 as CHPS. The end of World War II spelled an end to Parry Sound as an important manufacturing town and, with it, dashed all hopes of getting telecommunications capable of providing a network feed from the CBC. Orillia already had the necessary telecommunications and CFOR became a CBC Affiliate in 1946.

50 Years Ago - in 1970, CKLW-800 Windsor ON had two and a half million listeners, according to Arbitron, making "The Big 8" the seventh most listened to

radio station in North America, trailing stations in New York City and Chicago: WABC-770, WOR-710, WCB-880, WLS-890, WGN-720 and WINS-1010.

25 Years Ago – on September 7 1995, CFRY-920 Portage la Prairie MB was granted a license for a 27KW FM repeater, CFRY-1-FM, to provide night-time coverage South of the city, because the AM's night pattern has a tight Null to all points South. An exception to the CRTC's long-time ban on simulcasting AM on FM. The repeater became CHPO-FM in 2013, and is no longer simulcast with CFRY.

Zero Years Ago - on August 13 2020, the CRTC announced an October 13 hearing to decide on the pending sale, for nearly \$7 million, of CKER Edmonton AB to CJCN-FM Surrey BC. CKER was Alberta's first multilingual station when they signed on to 1480 with 10KW 40 years earlier. They moved to FM in 1994.

The final Rockwork 2020 session featured a real barn burner on Longwave, with both Alaskan and South Pacific NDB's at legendary levels. Live DXing under such conditions can be thrilling, but unfortunately you can only point an FSL antenna in one direction. Managing the most astonishing trip of the entire DXpedition, the 25 watt New Zealand aeronautical beacon 362-WK in Whakatane, New Zealand crossed 6,846 miles (11,017 km) of ocean and showed up with a perfectly readable signal (linked below) on the 12 inch (30 cm) Longwave FSL at 1315. Reception of this flea-powered beacon in North America is so rare that it has only been received by two other DXers in history – with any equipment. One was Tom Rothlisberger last year, using his SDR and broadband loop at this same Rockwork 4 DXpedition site.

The 50 watt New Zealand beacon 366-SF in Springfield, New Zealand also made a return appearance at 6,822 miles (10,977 km), as did 346-TG in Tauranga (6,857 miles/11,034 km) and the semi-regular 238-KT in Kaitaia. The S9+ signal from 320-Al in the Cook Island of Aitutaki was one for the ages blasting in at a science fiction level.

Thanks again to my DXpedition partner Tom for posting a detailed list of his record South Pacific NDB-DXing results last year (during Rockwork 2019) at https://www.qsl.net/k7wv/RockworkDX6.htm

Without his results (including many North American firsts) I wouldn't have a clue about which South Pacific NDB's to chase with my extremely basic gear. Rockwork is a Longwave NDB-DXing paradise!

Rockwork Ocean Cliff DU's for the Lucky 13th

8/15. Exceptional Longwave propagation during the DXpedition's final day gave a powerful boost to both the Kiwi stations on 531, as well as 558-Fiji and other low banders. With the ocean cliff delivering up 25 watt and 50 watt New Zealand beacons on Longwave the AM-DXing effort was mostly a remote control operation, with four sensitive FSL antennas recording 531, 558, 657 and 936 for the duration – and all coming up with S9 signals. Australian interlopers crashed the Kiwi regulars on both 657 (Star) and 936 (Chinese Voice) at times, resulting in wild S9 frequency fights. 657-Star was still going through echo and reverb issues on the final day, seemingly still indicating a synch issue between Wellington and Christchurch (IMHO).

I really wish that all TP-DXers could hear just a few of these monster DU signals on the side of a plunging 500 ft. (150m) ocean cliff during a sunrise session, looking out over the sweeping Pacific Ocean from the highly elevated Rockwork 4 perch... it would provide a permanent cure for any hobby boredom!

Marathon Ultralight Radio Track Down of 362-WK (25 watts at 11,017 km)

If anyone ever wondered why a DXer would want to set up on the side of a plunging ocean cliff at 0500 local time and go all-out to track down "impossible" transoceanic DX on "hopelessly" humble gear, the Rockwork ocean cliff on the Oregon state coast delivered a perfect example on August 13th - the last day of my DXpedition with Tom Rothlisberger.

The Longwave NDB-DXing hobby is based on advanced SDR receivers and state-of-the-art filters, which can track down and isolate extremely weak NDB's at long range when assisted by large broadband loop antennas. On the other hand the Ultralight Radio NDB-DXing hobby is based on a cheap, AM-mode-only \$50 pocket radio, which gets somewhat of a boost from a 12 inch (30cm) diameter Longwave FSL antenna if a live DXer is lucky enough to track down a long range beacon during good propagation while stuck in the AM mode (with a wimpy DSP filter, which allows reception of anything within 3 kHz). So why does this wacky hobby exist? Because of the supreme challenge of tracking down any long range Trans-Equatorial NDB's with such basic gear, and the supreme feeling of accomplishment when you beat all the odds and score a rare success.

On August 13th the South Pacific longwave propagation was exceptional at the cliff, and I knew I had a fighting chance to score some choice DX with the Ultralight + FSL combo. I had uploaded a list of Tom's record-breaking 2019 South Pacific NDB results into my phone, and during peak propagation the New Zealand and Cook Island beacons seemed to be scoring big, while others were MIA. The 50 watt flea-powered New Zealand beacon 366-SF in Springfield had just made a return appearance at a weak level (after 8/8) at 6,822 miles (10,977 km). So why not push my luck for all it's worth and go after a 25 watt beacon in the same area – 362-WK in Whakatane? (6,846 miles/11,017 km)

On 362 kHz there was indeed some weak Morse code from the South Pacific, but even after 2 minutes I still couldn't be completely sure of the call letters in the wickedly noisy ocean cliff environment. The signal seemed to tank just when I had identified a "W," and I thought my chances might be toast. But the weak signal came back gradually, and while going through this marathon I thought to myself, "WK must stand for "weak!" But finally there was a boost in signal strength, and I could clearly make out the "WK" signal identification after the thrilling 3 minute marathon (which was fully recorded, and is posted at the following link for those who wish to relive the excitement of the ultimate live DXing challenge without the ocean cliff's 18-wheeler noise, which made it much more difficult at the time) https://dreamcrafts.box.com/s/xjhugy27gzmza3zdjdw3hyrszr9lf4qk

25 watts at 6,846 miles - I almost felt like jumping into the Pacific for joy!

Rockwork Ocean Cliff DXpedition - Memorable DU Receptions

8/18. Tom Rothlisberger and I had the thrill of conducting the tenth annual Rockwork Cliff DXpedition this month, and once again lucked out with some exceptional South Pacific signals, especially on Longwave. 25 watt and 50 watt New Zealand Longwave aeronautical beacons were received on an Ultralight + FSL antenna combo, while other beacons in the Cook Islands, Micronesia and Alaska managed S9 levels. 558-Radio Fiji One had the best signal that any TP-DXer seems to

have heard so far on the west coast, while 558-6WA in Wagin, Western Australia was received at over 9,153 miles (14,736 km) at a good level.

The recordings below were all special for a reason – either a very strong signal, very low power or over a very great distance. Recordings which reached an S9 level are identified with a double asterisk (**). The ocean cliff was an awesome place for Tom and I to relax and enjoy the hobby right in the middle of the Pandemic - and also to enjoy the record-breaking transoceanic propagation to New Zealand and the South Pacific islands. Rock on, Rockwork!

Rockwork Ocean Cliff DXpedition - Alaskan, Hawaiian and South Pacific Longwave Results

8/21. Right in the middle of the Pandemic I had the honor of sharing the Rockwork Ocean Cliff (2 miles north of Manzanita, Oregon on Highway 101) with my long time DXpedition partner Tom Rothlisberger from August 7-10, as well as on the 5th, 6th, 11th, 12th and 13th. The Longwave NDB-DXing results during this trip were exceptional, making it my most productive Longwave trip so far. Tom is a pretty fanatical NDB-DXer, and I'm a pretty fanatical FSL antenna tinkerer, so maybe this is the result when two fanatics interact with each other and get wacky DXing results?

The 13th featured Ultralight + FSL antenna reception of 362-WK in Whakatane, New Zealand, which at 25 watts has to be my best NDB catch ever at

Rockwork. The combination of exceptional Alaskan and South Pacific reception on the 13th was something I had never experienced, resulting in bizarre situations like 390-HBT in Sand Point, Alaska becoming an S9 pest as I was trying for 390-HN in Hamilton, NZ. Overall the South Pacific NDB-DXing results during this trip were far and away my best results ever, with both the 25 watt 362-WK and the 50 watt 366-SF providing decent signals on the 12" Longwave FSL over 11,000 km of ocean from New Zealand. 327-VYI from Maui, Hawaii was also new for me from Rockwork, and the S9+ signal from 320-AI in the Cook Islands was breathtaking (although not new). Like I've shared with others, chasing long range Trans-Equatorial NDB's with a modified \$50 pocket radio and a 12 inch (30cm) FSL antenna on a plunging ocean cliff is so much fun that it seems like it should be illegal!

Rockwork Ocean Cliff - Top Twelve Blasters from the South Pacific

This month at Oregon's notorious ocean side cliff the transoceanic DX propagation turned completely upside down from what we typically tolerate at our inland west coast locations. Not a trace of a single Asian station was heard for 9 days, but several South Pacific stations from Fiji, Tonga, New Zealand and Australia went on a romping rampage, continually testing the crunch resistance of the CC Skywave and XHDATA D-808 portables that I had brought along.

For the benefit of those who have yet to visit this wacky place, here is what can happen to trans-equatorial DX signals when you are not only high above the

salt water, but enjoy an ocean cliff signal boost at the same time.

- 531 NEW ZEALAND More FM, Alexandra, 2 kW. This obscure Kiwi rocker is extremely rare DX away from the cliff, but with a Longwave propagation boost at 1251 on 8/08 it definitely gets your full attention. Female-voiced ID is at 16 seconds, "More FM, hanging out, all night"

Rockwork Ocean Cliff DXpedition - Alaskan, Hawaiian and South Pacific Longwave Results (Tom Rothlisberger)

8/21. Below are my NDB results from my 4 mornings at the cliff. I was pleased to receive 58 AUS/NZL/Pacific NDBs which is two more than in 2018, making this my second best haul out of 7 DXpeditions here. Compared to 2019 however, a whole layer of deep DX is missing. The Australians in particular were just above the noise floor for several minutes before fading back into the background. Still got 11 of them but only due to the nice quiet conditions this year. The loud and unexpected signals from normally weak 366 SF and 362 WK did not seem to bring any other 25-50 watt NZL signals along for the ride. A couple of 49 watt Australians were in however, comprising 2 of the 3 new beacons to Rockwork.

As for Alaska the conditions on the two mornings that I moved the antenna were not so good. The one surprise was SPY from St Paul Island, freed up from the discontinued DGPS from both the US and Australia.

In all a good "fishing trip" on the LW side. Next up: MW. It was great fun operating with Gary during the 3 mornings when we were together, and congrats to him for the new catches, especially 25-watt WK!

DXpedition #15 - August G Beckemeier Conservation Area, Chesterfield MO Eric Bueneman (NØUIH)

For my fifteenth DXpedition, I decided to try another Missouri Conservation Area. This time, I decided to give the August G Beckemeier Conservation Area a try. Located on Olive Boulevard (Missouri Highway 340) in Chesterfield MO, it is a 54-acre site located about 20 miles west-northwest of downtown Saint Louis. I recorded a couple of firsts on this DXpedition. It was the first DXpedition where I didn't have to sit in the minivan to DX, as I set up my equipment on a picnic table. Second, I didn't have to put up my portable 30-foot longwire for shortwave DX; I used an MFJ-1022 active antenna, powered by a nine-volt battery, instead. No tropical band DX was noted this time.

I began monitoring around 1935 ELT; sunset skip conditions on the AM BCB favored the Midwest and Mid-South, while DX conditions on the shortwave bands favored Europe, the Americas, the Pacific and East Asia. Temperatures were around 80 degrees Fahrenheit under mostly clear skies at the time. I wrapped up monitoring around 2130 ELT.

IL, Berwyn – 8/21 2112 noted with talk on domestic violence, "The Talk of Chicago, 1690 WVON" ID into promo. A good signal was heard over

AR, Fort Smith – 8/21 2120 noted with Southern Gospel format, "98-7 the Cross" ID. A fair to poor signal was heard, mixing with KCNZ.

1700 KBGG IA, Des Moines – 8/21 2106 noted with Kansas City Royals baseball play-by-play, "1700 the Champ" ID into local ads. A good signal was heard over KKLF.

1700 KKLF TX, Richardson – 8/21 2105 noted with Mexican music and local ads in Spanish. A fair to poor signal was heard, mixing with KBGG.

Saint Louis County MO was under a Shelter-in-Place Order from March 23 to May 18 2020. During that time, I spent a lot more time at the dials. This is an unprecedented time in our history; broadcast radio was still a year away when the Spanish Influenza pandemic hit the United States in 1919. It is amazing how far we have come in just a century.

How many of us have told our radio stories? I thought I would tell you my radio story. As a 10-year-old in late 1976, I discovered that I could listen to medium wave broadcasts from outside the Saint Louis area at night. The first out-of-town signal I discovered was WBBM 780 Chicago. During sixth grade (1978-79), I discovered that I could also hear a few 50 kW Chicago stations, like WMAQ (now WSCR) 670 and WLS 890 during the day. I could even hear WGN 720, even though I had a 1,000-watt daytime-only station just 50 miles away: KWRE 730 in Warrenton, MO. I also discovered more out-of-town medium wave signals, like WLW 700 in Cincinnati, WSM 650 in Nashville (home of the Grand Ole Opry), WSB 750 in Atlanta and KOA 850 in Denver. On the weekends, I could stay up late enough to hear the Truckers shows from WBAP 820 kHz Fort Worth or WWL 870 New Orleans.

The 50 kW medium wave stations also had a lot of sports, like Detroit Tigers baseball and Red Wings hockey from WJR 760, Chicago White Sox baseball (announced by Harry Caray) on WMAQ, Atlanta Braves baseball and Hawks basketball on WSB, Cincinnati Reds baseball on WLW or Minnesota Twins baseball and North Stars hockey on WCCO 830 Minneapolis. Saint Louis 50 kW blowtorch, KMOX 1120, had Cardinals baseball and football, Blues hockey and University of Missouri basketball and football, as well as overnight middle-of-the-road music, hosted by John McCormick on weeknights and Tony Oren on the weekends. Most people of my generation had already discovered FM radio by that time; many listened to KSHE 94.7 MHz or KSLQ (now KYKY) 98.1 MHz. A few still listened to AM, like KXOK (now KYFI) 630 and KWK (now KXFN) 1380.

Shortly after I entered eighth grade in 1980, I discovered something different on 600 kHz. Even with a local 1 kW station on 590 kHz (WRTH Wood River IL, now KFNS), the signal featured a variety of music, news and commentary. It took a few days to find out that the programming came from Radio Moscow North American service. The programming was relayed by a 150,000-watt facility in Urbano Noris, Cuba. The schedule included the North American service until 10:00 pm Central US time, Radio Moscow World Service from 10:00 to 11:00 pm Central US time, and the Voice of Cuba (produced by Radio Havana Cuba) from 11:00 pm to 4:00 am Central US time. It was at that point that I set my mind on getting a shortwave receiver. I still tuned around to US stations; I was tuned to WABC 770 New York when I heard the news that John Lennon was shot on December 8 1980. Toward the end of 1980, I was hearing audio image transmissions from shortwave broadcasts above 1600 kHz on one of my portable radios from throughout the Americas. I was hearing Radio Canada International, WYFR, VOA Greenville and HCJB just above 1600.

In October 1981, I got my first shortwave receiver, a Realistic DX-60 portable receiver. I still have this receiver; it features AM, FM, the Citizens band and three shortwave bands. I started hearing BBC World Service, Deutsche Welle, Radio RSA, Radio Nederland, Kol Israel, Radio Japan, Radio Korea and Radio Peking, in addition to RCI, VOA, WYFR and HCJB. Before I finished my first year of DXing, I began seriously DXing the medium wave and FM broadcast bands as well as broadcast television. In July of 1982, I got my monitor call from the WDX Monitoring Service: KDX0STL. The K in the call sign stands for my location west of the Mississippi River and the STL for the Saint Louis metropolitan area. The following year, I joined the World Listening Service with the call WLS5MO. In 1984, having taken up casual Public service monitoring, I got the call KMO0CN from CRB Research. I joined my first club, the old ASWLC, in May 1982; I joined NRC that August. It was through NRC that I met Saint Louis DXers Terry Klasek and Rich Eddie; we had a local group called SLIDX (Saint Louis International DXers); I met antenna experimenter Bob Flick through that group. I learned a lot about the hobby from Rich Eddie. I joined IRCA in the spring of 1994.

In October 1982, I upgraded to a Realistic DX-200 tabletop communications receiver; I began DXing the Amateur Radio bands. The Hams I QSLed encouraged me to go for my license; I put that on the back burner while I was in college. In June 1985, I upgraded again; this time to a Realistic DX-400. That fall, I started college as a Communication Arts major; I began helping out the staff at KCFV 89.5 MHz Ferguson MO, becoming a DJ in the fall of 1986. In August of 1988, I relocated with my family to Woodstock, GA, I built another homebrew antenna for shortwave radio from telephone wire and put it in the baseboards of my bedroom. During that time, I volunteered for a month at WRFG 89.3 MHz in Atlanta before getting lured away to a master control operator job at WFTD 1080 Marietta. I even worked briefly at 16-watt WGHR 102.5 MHz at Southern Polytechnic State University (now Kennesaw State University-Marietta) doing an Oldies show. When I relocated to Marietta in June of 1991, I made another homebrew antenna for shortwave out of speaker wire and a metal coat hanger; I heard plenty of DX with that antenna. I kept that antenna when I returned to Hazelwood at the end of June 1992. In 1994, the string on the upper tuning cylinder of the DX-200 snapped; I used the DX-400 for both shortwave and medium wave DX until adding my present Sangean ATS-803A in October 1995; I bought that from local DXer Tony Jasper. In 1997 the DX-400 blew; I switched to a General Electric Superadio III (which I bought in 1994) for medium wave DX. Later in 1997, I ditched the homebrew coat hanger antenna for an MFJ-1778 G5RV antenna. I bought the National NC-60 Special at a Hamfest in August 1998; I use that for some medium wave and shortwave DXing. My main AM broadcast band rig in the shack, the Yaesu FRG-7, was acquired at a Hamfest in January 2011; I've also used it for shortwave DX.

In late 1991, I began studying for my Technician class Amateur Radio license. The Morse Code requirement for that class of license had just been dropped, and that motivated me to study. I passed the first exam required for the license at a Hamfest in Washington MO in July 1992; I passed the second exam needed for the entry level license at a Hamfest in Saint Charles MO the following month. In fact, I passed the exam the day before beginning my second tour of duty at KCFV 89.5; I received my license in October 1992 with the call sign N0UIH. I learned twelve characters of Morse Code under the tutelage of one of the professors in the School of Engineering at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville before the Morse Code requirement for all license classes was dropped; I upgraded to a General Class license in June 2007 by passing the written exam on my second try through the Cliff Cave Volunteer Examiner team, which gives license exams at the Cliff Cave branch of the Saint Louis County Library in Oakville MO. In May 2012, after taking a course through one of the local Amateur Radio clubs, I upgraded to an Amateur Extra Class license, only needing one try to pass the exam, also administered by the Cliff Cave Volunteer Examiner team.

In late 2018, after hearing lectures on the topic at the International Radio Club of America convention in Saint Charles MO, I began taking DXpeditions to parks and conservation areas in the Saint Louis region. I homebrewed a 30-foot longwire for portable use on the shortwave bands; I bought a Tecsun PL-600 for shortwave DXing away from the shack. Since November 2018, I have been on two DXpeditions to Babler State Park in Wildwood MO, Marais Temps Clair Conservation Área in Black Walnut MO and Sioux Passage County Park near Florissant MO, along with single DXpeditions to Lincoln Shields Recreation Area in West Alton MO, James S McDonnell County Park near Saint Ann MO, Creve Coeur County Park in Maryland Heights MO and Pere Marquette State Park near Grafton IL. This year's DXpedition season was delayed until June due to the COVID-19 pandemic; I've made DXpeditions to Weldon Spring Conservation Area in Weldon Spring MO and Saint Stanislaus Conservation Area two miles west of my home shack, as well as a third DXpedition to Marais Temps Clair during June 2020. Most recently, I went on my third DXpedition to Sioux Passage.

I have been DXing the shortwave bands since October 1981, the medium wave broadcast band since December 1981, the FM broadcast band and analog television since April 1982, the NOAA Weather Radio band (162.4-162.55 MHz) since January 2001, and digital TV since September 2005. Today, my main home shack features Sangean ATS-803A, National NC-60 Special and Yaesu FRG-7 communication receivers for shortwave and medium wave DX, a Kenwood AR-304 AM/FM/FM Stereo receiver with filter modification for FM broadcast band DX, and a Uniden Bearcat BCD996P2 for NOAA Weather Radio DX and VHF/UHF analog and digital Public Service band monitoring, two Zenith DTT-901 digital TV tuners, one hooked to a 1984-built Samsung 19-inch color TV and the other to a 1999-built Daewoo 13-inch color TV for TV DX, and a Uniden Bearcat BC980SSB AM/SSB Citizens Band radio for general talking (Hams call it 'rag chewing' and monitoring the truckers on Channel 19 (27185 kHz). I have built homebrew antennas for shortwave (a 150-foot dipole in the attic and a 30-foot outdoor longwire) and the Citizens Band (an inverted "V"). For medium wave DX, I have a Worcester Electronics Space Magnet II ferrite core loop hooked to the FRG-7; I use an Apex 303WA-2 vertical antenna, hooked to the National NC-60 Special, for some shortwave and medium wave DX; I bought the Apex in August 2018. For FM and TV DX, I use a Channel Master CM-3020 VHF/UHF Yagi I bought in the summer of 2016; the antenna is 28 feet above ground level. For the Public Service and NOAA Weather Radio bands, I use a Radio Shack discone antenna I bought in 2004; that antenna is 32 feet above ground level. Most recently, I added an SDRplay RSPdx softwaredefined receiver.

This hobby also led to a 22-year broadcasting career; most of my career was in the Saint Louis area. In addition to the aforementioned stations, I worked as a studio engineer and staff announcer at WGNU 920 Granite City IL (now licensed to Saint Louis MO) in 1996 and 97, studio/remote engineer and staff announcer at WFUN-FM 95.5 Bethalto IL from August 1997 to June 1999, and as a studio engineer, DJ (evening, fill-in and morning), Public Service Director and hockey coverage coordinator at WSIE 88.7 Edwardsville IL from May 2000 to July 2009. I briefly worked at KDHX 88.1 MHz Saint Louis MO taking pledges during the June Membership Drive in 2015.

In addition to IRCA, I am also a member of NASWA, WTFDA, ARRL and two local Amateur Radio clubs, the Saint Louis and Suburban Radio Club and the Lewis and Clark Radio Club. If there is one thing 38 years in this hobby has taught me, it is being patient when hearing the DX. This is especially important in all areas of life during this unprecedented time. 73 and good DX from the Florissant Valley Dial Twister.

Greetings. All times and dates strictly UT. Receiver: IC-R75 with E-W longwire; DX-398 with internal antenna only or PL-880; NRD-545 with ALA-330S inside E-W or inside random wire N-S; Nissan stock caradio as specified;

This report covers August 10-23. Extracted from my daily all-band log reports as archived here: http://www.worldofradio.com/Hauserlogs.html. Some items include monitoring and comments by others besides me.

CANADA. 248-MCW kHz, August 21 at 0555, dash and WG, 1000 watt ND beacon from Winnipeg, Manitoba. Only Canadian ever heard among seven listed on 248, two of them also a kilowatt and four of them also with 2-letter calls lacking a Y- or -Z, but all with a dash of course. 346-MCW kHz, August 21 at 0601, dash and YXL, 500 watt NDB from Sioux Lookout, Ontario. It's way NW of Thunder Bay, not an area we associate today with the Sioux First Nation. This does not explain where the name came from: https://www.northernontario.travel/sunset-country/7-interesting-facts-aboutsioux-lookout but a "Lac Seul" figures in its history so I wonder if Seul was mistaken as "Sioux"? - pronounced soo/sue. Such interesting learning experiences provided by beacon DXing.

CANADA. Although there is still some storm noise, Blitzortung shows only small spots on fringes of conterminous USA, far from here with quietude in the Great Center, so with LW overall noise level abated, August 18 at 0639-0647 I can relog a number of Canadian ND beacons as well as Unitedstatesians, qv: 326-MCW, dash and YQK, 200 watts from Kenora, Ontario, 332-MCW, dash and QT under IC Wichita, 1000 watts Thunder Bay, Ontario, 346-MCW, dash and YXL, stronger, 500 watts from Sioux Lookout, Ontario, 366-MCW, dash and YMW, 500 watts from Maniwaki, Quebec, 382-MCW, dash and YPL, 1000 watts from Pickle Lake, Ontario, In reverse order as I was really down-tuning.

USA. Lowered LW noise level allows some ND beacon logs again, from CANADA, qv, and, August 18 at 0635-0646, in reverse order from really tuning downward: 335-MCW, BV, 25 watts from Batesville-Almond, Arkansas, 347-MCW, AFK, 25 watts from Nebraska City, Nebraska, 365-MCW, AA, 100 watts, Fargo-Harwood, North Dakota, tuned 363-USB, 389-MCW, DDP - oops, see PUERTO RICO! 420-MCW, PK, 25 watts from Olathe-Herbb,

OKLAHOMA [and non]. 341-MCW kHz, August 13 at 1354 in full daytime, NDB in Enid, EI is JBA, while OIN Oberlin KS is JJBBA underneath.

PUERTO RICO. 391-MCW kHz, August 18 at 0638, DDP among the US and Canadian ND beacons, qq. vv.; it's 1000 watts from San Juan-Dorado. I was tuned to 389-USB. Logged previously, rarely in January and March this year. 3676 km = 2284 statute miles.

OKLAHOMA. 515-MCW kHz, August 11 at 0648 and 1410, NDB PN in Ponca City is off again, while the other local-Okies remain on 350, 341, 255

OKLAHOMA. 515-MCW kHz, August 12 at 1406, NDB PN in Ponca City is off; 341-MCW, EI in Enid is on now; earlier at 0623 I could not make it out vs HSNL, but traces of OIN in KS.

OKLAHOMA. 515-MCW kHz, August 14 at 0600, NDB PN Ponca City is still off; 341-MCW, El Enid is still on.
OKLAHOMA [and non]. 515-MCW kHz, August 15 at 0626, NDB PN in Ponca City is still off; 341-MCW El in Enid is still on. Too much storm noise from KS to detect much else, but two signals seem mixing on 420, probably PK in KS and FQ in MN, from previous experience, both 25 watts.
OKLAHOMA. 515-MCW kHz, August 17 at 0617, NDB PN Ponca City is still off, and 341-MCW kHz, El Enid JBA is still on.

OKLAHOMA. 515-MCW kHz, August 18 at 0634, NDB PN Ponca City is still off; 314-MCW EI Enid is still on nearby but JBA.

OKLAHOMA. 515-MCW kHz, August 21 at 0601, NDB PN Ponca City still off; 341-MCW kHz, EI Enid still on but JJBBA.

UnID. 600, August 12 at 0618, 'Coast to Coast AM' from a strong station and a weaker one echoing. WMT Cedar Rapids, lowa, lost tower during the derecho, and was reported off the air; it's normally dominant here, lobe aiming thisaway but does not quite make it, days. https://600wmtradio.iheart.com/content/2020-08-11-legendary-am-600-wmt-radio-cedar-rapids-off-air-after-high-wind-storm/ The other listed C2CAM 600 affiliates in last year's NRC AM Log are KCOL in CO, KTBB in TX and WREC in TN, all of which could also be heard here.

USA. 600, August 14 at 0605, "Newsradio 600, WMT" ID after Fox "news" and then local weather, from a TV station; dominant signal on its 1.25? kW ND day facility with the directional nite tower down-blown by the derecho in Cedarapids IA. I can't be too sympathetic to WMT plight as they spew loathsome Limbaugh and hateful Hannity; but a much wider variety of talk shows on weekends.

CUBA [and non]. 711.0, August 17 at 0602, JBA het presumably one of the Radios Rebeldes knocked off-frequency again like a few months ago. Too weak to get DF on it, but the only TA carrier this late is 621 presumed Canary Islands. More below.

UnID. Cursory trans-Atlantic JBÁ MW carrier check August 18 at 0122: two on 684, Spain being the one off-frequency; 891 no doubt Algeria, but no 711 at this time. From 0327: 531, 621, 684, 693, 774, 855(2), 898, 1098(2), 1107* strongest, 1215, 1305; and 711.0, so is that Cuba or not? No DFing. At 0630, JBA carrier about 710.4, not 711. Months ago, Steve Wiseblood in the RGV presumed he was getting Rebelde on 710.5 but I never did. Also 621 presumed Canary, 846 Kiritimati/Pacific, maybe 1098, Marshalls. WOR iog discussion of my previous 711 log: "When nearby 621 from Canary Islands could be heard easily in North America, why not the 711 Moroccan transmission too? Right 3 kilometers distance to the Atlantic Ocean coastline. MRC_Laayoune 711/864 300kW (El Aaiun), del 567/657 5/50Kw location GC 27°10'21.58" N 13°21'40.93" W https://www.bing.com/maps?osid=e578e77b-a265-46e5-90e5-f86f630f0b38&cp=27.17377~-

13.362753&IvI=18&style=h&v=2&sV=2&form=S00027 73 wb" "Maybe SNRT antenna is too directional in El Aaiún. But I don't know how it is behaving in practice. I also have no idea if the EMWG data is valid or not today. In the former Euro-African Medium Wave Guide (EMWG), the following data were: 711: AOE-SNRT Al-Idaâ al-Amazighia (El-Aaiún), El Aaiún (300, directional 180°) – 24h in Tamazight (Berber), Tachelhit, Rifain, Arabic exc. when local programmes are on air: Monday-Thursday 1800-1900 Arabic, Friday 1800-2300 Arabic, Saturday 0000-0200 Arabic, Saturday 1800-2300 Arabic; Sunday 1000-1300 Arabic, Sunday 1800-0200 Arabic; relay of SNRT El-Aaiún: Friday-Saturday 2200-2300 Arabic; Monday 0900-1300 Rabat programme; local ID "Maghribiyya Laayoune"; very low audio – offset frequency of 710.9970 (Tibor Gaal, Hungary)" Months ago when Cuba was skewed before, we had this same problem. If it's too weak to DF, another way to rule out Eurafrica is hearing it later when it's daytime there, still dark between here and Cuba, so when I rouse circa 0900 August 18, quick check hears nothing above 710, so inconclusive. Need further checks.

UnID. Trans-Pacific JBA MW carrier search, August 18 at 1151, on the DX-398 so DFing: 657, 792 and 1008 all WSW; two? on 1242. Enid LSR 1152, so almost too late but that was when I happened to awaken. All of these have NZ or eastern Australia possibilities, under 50 kW except for one. Then a check of lowband 10-kHz channels for Mexicans found none.

UnID. Trans-Atlantic JBA MW carrier search, August 19 at 0152 on R75 and longwire so no DFing, the first one may not be Cuba: 711, 891, 936(2), 1044, 1053, 1089, 1107, 1125, 1134, 1215(2), 1296, 1306. At 0615 August 19 I am still getting only: 711, 846(surely Kiritimati TP), 882, 936.

UnID. JBA MW carrier search of 9-kHz frequencies, August 20 at 0617: only 711, 846 and 1071. 846 no doubt regular Kiritimati but never with audio; 711 Cuba or Morocco barely? 1071 intriguing with no Europeans more than 10 kW, no NZ/Australians more than 5. Several ME/Africans but too daytime. Of course there's that megawatt in India, but way too early for that. Note that het/carriers 1 kHz off 10 kHz frequencies are often easier to detect than further in between with lots of splash from both sides.

UnID. JBA MW carrier search August 21 at 0550: 621, 846, 882, 1125 with two beating. Presumed Canary, Kiritimati; 882 has another low-powered Canarian; and 1125 several low-powered continental Spaniards.

UnID. JBA 9-kHz MW carrier search August 22 at 0607: 936 the only one, Morocco? Not even 711 or 846-Kiritimati, off? K-index at 0600 was 2, no storms per WWV.

KIRITIMATI. 846, August 17 at 0609, JBA carrier but with some decent peaks, surely Radio Kiribati, Christmas Island and not Europe, whence this late the only TA carrier trace is 621 Canary/Africish. 846, 10 kW is the closest TP split-frequency station, and it's already well after dark there; and anyway there are no Europeans on 846 more than 3 kW. Additionally I get a rough DX-398 DF as closer to E/W than NE/SW. True bearing is 252 degrees, distance only 4500 miles, and due south of Hawaii, in the *western* hemisphere. As measured on my trusty NGS globe. Neither gaisma.com nor distancefromto.net can cope with the fact that *this* part of Kiribati, the Line Islands, is *far* removed from the main part to the west, giving out false readings for London, Kiritimati as if it were on HQ island Tarawa, 6114 miles away and with local time as+12 instead of +14! LSS varies only half an hour over the course of a year, only 2 degrees from the Equator. It should be similar to Honolulu which was 0500 today. But this gets it: https://www.timeanddate.com/worldclock/@11185877 with LSS at 18:38 minus 14 hours = 0438.

KIRITIMATI. 846, August 23 at 0608, JBA carrier presumed Radio Kiribati, with no other 9-kHz audible from Eurafrica.

USA. At 0428 August 22 I first posted 1070 to several DX groups: "WCSZ DX test from SC, OK to OK – I am posting before reading reports from anyone else about this. On R75 with {100-foot} E-W longwire, already aimed in right direction. 0357 August 22 tune-in to usual jumble of presumed KNX, KFTI and more jumble. 0402: suddenly absolutely clear Morse code ID: VVV DE WCSZ, twice or was it thrice? No voice IDs or any announcements heard so far. But none needed after the above. 0404: Handel's Messiah, Hallelujah Chorus until 0410. Then some other music, no ID heard but may have been lost in QRM. 0412 tune-out but may recheck later. Unknown how long test runs, on 1070. Sometimes atop, generally mixing with news/talk presumed KNX, and country music presumed from KFTI Wichita which is low power {1 kW} at night, but too close to here and always an annoyance since it's significantly off-frequency-minus. Now {on USB} I have been adjusting the PBT to get rid of the LAH if not all of its modulation. Thanks for the test. Please QSL if possible. New NRC AM Log says: U4 50000/1500; STA U1 2000/375 – tech issues. U4 means different directional patterns day and night. But FCC AM Query says ND day, directional night. NRC Pattern Book 2013 shows ND day circular pattern, I think, very crowded map with all those other 1070s in the SE. So was this test really ND, and how much power at the start? Until the next, Best of DX and 73 de Glenn Hauser, PO Box 1684, Enid OK 73702" I did recheck a couple more times just as Morse IDs played again: VVV DE WCSZ WCSZ, at 0443.5 and 0459.5. Later widely reported as far as Norway, and Seattle – but I bet not much closer to KNX. 1404 km = 873 stmi from Sans Souci SC to Enid. Greenville market. The code IDs were a welcome surprise as earlier publicity said there would be no such thing, nor sweep tones, etc. Test committee chairman Les Rayburn in AL now says: "The DX Test was operated by engineer Al Hajny. His Email address is: alhajny@gmail.com. Mr Hajny has a history of being very friendly to DXers.

USA. 1210, August 10 at 0558, a periodic but vain check for 50 kW daytimer WJNL in Michigan cheating again; instead I hear a mix of Spanish mentions of McAllen, Texas, and Coast-to-Coast-AM. Per last year's NRC AM Log, only 1210 affil is WPHT Philadelphia, while the Spanish is certainly KUBR San Juan, Tejas in the RGV; right now I am not hearing KGYN OK either.

USA. Minor DXpedition to 35 km north of Enid on US 81 to carry out AM and FM bandscans, Sunday afternoon August 23 from 2140 to 2215, on caradio: 750, at 2140 no KMMJ Grand Island NE, apparently still temporarily off by STA pending sale. Has unusual L3 license i.e. almost daytime directional tangent west with 10.5 kW, but used to be JBA here; and neighbor 880 KRVN is always audible daytime tnx to the Ogallala Aquifer. However at 2208 I can detect a slow SAH of 64/min, slightly over 1 Hz apart. The only others nearby are KSEO Durant OK, 220 watt daytimer on the other side of the state, very difficult here; and KBNN Lebanon center of MO, 5 kW ND daytimer which I have heard several times; unless KMMJ really be on but QRP like 1130 KLEY. 1130, August 23 at 2142, I expect silence as KLEY Wellington KS, just across from OK, has not been heard at Enid HQ for months, after transmitter troubles, and suspected off for good. But now I have JBA music, certainly not sportive KWKH Shreveport, which despite 50 kW ND daytime does not reach this far some 500 km by groundwave. We drive a few km further north, to about a km south of the US 64/60/81 intersection, helpfully away from some power lines, and hear at 2154 a partial ID of "point 3" and rock song playing just past 2200; 2201, "KLEY 1130 AM and – 100.3 FM – wellington.net – The home of – sports, what capitol of the world". [Enid disputes that!] This is still a really tiny signal, vs many other further loud Kansans like 1150 KSAL, 1280 KSOK. KLEY is licensed for 250 watts day, ONE WATT night, and I can easily believe this *is* that one watt if not whatever the exciter may rate. Their 100.3 FM translator, really K262CQ, "The Wave" is what counts, and this much itty-bitty AM to simulcast keeps it legal. Anyway this makes KLEY 1130 quite a DX target further away since I can't even hear it inside Enid. OTOH, note my report from 2019y: "1130, September 20 at 1853 check, KLEY Wellington KS is OFF again. Still off at 1705 check September 21. It had been on since August 26 after a

year be elapsed. I had never heard it since then. 1157 and 1183, at 2203, IBOC noise is definitely ON from 1170 KFAQ Tulsa at this time, blocking anything possible on 1160 and 1180. 1370, still no trace of KGNO Dodge City KS at 2205, which I have not been able to detect in years, day or night, 5000/230 watts, and suspect OFF but it continues to be listed as if active. It would be nice if we had someone in Dodge to try to hear it, maybe QRP too? It used to be easy to Enid at least SR/SS. I check 1370 whenever I am N/W of Enid. 1440, gospel huxter in English, very poor at 2205, must be KEXB University Park (Metroplex) TX in its latest incarnation, Relevant Radio, barely making it here with 50 kW daytime this high in band, not Topeka. On FM, not much of interest and am running out of time, but: 105.7, at 2214 "Classic Hits 105.7", adstring and rock music – and same stuff on 106.1! but with one radio can't tell whether synchronized. 105.7 is 50/50 kW KRDR Alva, while 106.1 is weaker with CCI from something else. Nearest "classic hits" format if not slogan on 106.1 in WTFDA DB is 60/60 kW KYVZ Atwood KS, way up in the NW corner beyond Colby. But 100 kW KXKU Lyons KS is closer, in between. Other possible 106.1s in OK are KBZI 50/50 kW in Mooreland west of here almost Woodward, with "80s hits" – close enough to classic by now? and KTGK 100/100 kW Owasso almost Tulsa, country.

WORLD OF RADIO 2048 monitoring: confirmed Saturday August 22 at 2002 on WAORCR, 1860-AM, Wentzville MO, via KiwiSDR a few km away in Warrenton, very good S8 about 4 minutes into so started circa 1958 instead of nominal 1930. Confirmed Sunday August 23 starting at 0326.8 on WAORCR, 1860-AM via Warrenton MO SDR, S5-S8 sufficient vs storm noise level.

UnID. 4765, August 10 at 0433, noise blob but not decoding as DRM by TWR Bonaire SDR; meant to check earlier, as Mark Coady, Ontario, reported on the ODXA iog: "4765 UNIDENTIFIED at 0205 with DRM-like hash covering +/- 6 to 7 Khz – A total waste of bandwidth August 9 Coady-ON – Are the Cubans experimenting with DRM now? If so, why? And, if not, who is?" – Progreso sked is nominally/normally 0030-0400 only.

CUBA. 4765, August 12 at *0029 just as I tune in via Virginia KiwiSDR, noise blob cuts on air covering 4760-4770, evidence that this mess is just the Radio Progreso transmitter as scheduled but totally out of whack: no trace of program modulation. It does not sound like DRM however, and the SDR does not recognize or decode it as such; in fact, if you mash DRM you get a roster of known DRM transmissions, maybe not the current frequency. Hey, at this very time, Arnie should be in AM on Radio Havana Cuba for the mit-week [sic] edition of 'DXers Unlimited', so he could explain it! But he won't as he never deals with any of countless Cuban technical SNAFUs; instead it's all about ham DX for the last few minutes of his show. 6000 is suptorted [not "supported" as one editor "corrected" a previous mention: I explain again that I coined that word to combine suppressed and distorted, which is just what Radio Havana Cuba and some other stations provide] while 6145 is sufficient. Meanwhile 5025 Rebelde is undermodulated but readable and not distorted. The 4765 blob is still same around 0130, and by 0400 is off, again matching Progreso scheduling.

CUBA. 4765, August 13 at 0054, Radio Progreso back in whack with music modulation in AM mode rather than noise blob; vs some CODAR swishes, checked at Rochester SDR.

SOLOMON ISLANDS. 5020, August 11 at 0646, JBA carrier in 5025 Cuba splash, presumed SIBC, about all one could expect so early, but have not been getting even this around 0600 check.

CUBA. 5055, August 22 at 0614, mixture of talk and music, NOT 4KZ, AUSTRALIA! But leapfrog mixing product another 15 kHz beyond, of 5025 Rebelde over 5040 Radio Havana Cuba English, the latter on later than usual, and with same extreme modulation breaking up 'Ed Newman' on both. 5055 is S9+10; 5040 is S9+20/30; 5025 with good music modulation is also S9+20/30. Both fundamentals listed as Bauta site. There is no reverse leapfrog on 5010, luckily for WRMI earlier. 0616 Rebelde female ID and TC for 2:16 am.

USA. 5085, Sunday August 16 at 0020, after a hamadstring and WTWW plea for listener \$\$, 'TONITO' starts and runs until 0050. Bob Heil is presenting a recording of his performance in 1966 on the Hammond Organ he built for a Holiday Inn in Columbus OH; I have switched to #2 webcast where \$tereo is possible, and it does sound so on a rather noisy old tape.

USA. 5085, Sunday August 23 at 0023, WTWW-2 with hard-sell Tedad, no TONITO yet; 0035 recheck is underway presenting performance by someone else, now deceased, ending at 0057 so started circa 0027 this week. I immediately brought up the \$tereo webcast instead. BTW, besides the degraded audio on 5085, it's still always accompanied by JBA spur-carriers circa 5072.1 and 5097.9. And this: "I know WTWW on 5085 KHz has contained very noticeable audio distortion for years. Sounds like a portable with weak batteries. It has low-end punch, mind you, but is totally ruined with this annoying distortion in the mix. If one uses narrower IF bandwidth filters, this will not be so noticeable. "Dave's Radio Receiver Page" https://www.qsl.net/n9ewo/ Dave N9EWO" Zantow.

WORLD OF RADIO 2047 confirmed Monday August 17 starting at 0302.5 on Area 51 via WBCQ 5130, S9+10 but high storm noise level. Until the next, Best of DX and 73 de Glenn!

AM DX, HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL and COVID-19 (Les Rayburn)

High School football broadcasts represent an opportunity to log new stations for many DXers each season. The abundance of local ads, high school nicknames, etc. all make it easier to identify weak stations.

But CoronaVirus will impact HSFB this season. Some states have decided to postpone their games until later in the year or even 2021. Others are still evaluating the situation and haven't made decisions about when the games will start.

In some states where in-person classes have started early, outbreaks are occurring that may force changes.

All this shapes up to make this a most unusual high school football season and will alter the opportunities that may exist for distant listeners.

For example, Colorado has decided to move their season to a "Spring" schedule with games slated to begin on March 4 2021. Propagation will be quite different than those normally experienced in the Fall.

Wisconsin has decided to start their games in late September, which means by the time their playoffs roll around, we should be experiencing the quiet of the winter season with much less noise at night.

This information is current as of August 12 2020 – but the 'situation is fluid.' For the latest information about any given state, consult the website of their high school athletic association. Enjoy listening to the games on the radio. Nothing is quite as American as high school football on a Friday night.
